The Independence Day parade on July 1 in Carpinteria saw a slightly larger crowd than last year (estimated at around 7,000 people), and they gave our Friends of Bates Beach entry a very enthusiastic reception with many smiles and happy waves as we drove past. This was our 10th year of participation.

We had a great group of FOBB volunteers who helped decorate Mike Glinzak's truck with red-white-blue bunting, flags, and magnetic signs. Waiting for the signal to start, some of us interacted with several city council members and the city mayor.

The 10-block parade had around 40 participating groups, slightly fewer than in previous years. Missing were the city's Junior lifeguards and the high school band, but the cheerleaders were there, as was the bus carrying the past winners of "Carpinterian of the Year" and the flatbed truck that had members of the city council sitting on haystacks.

The local VFW color guard opened the parade, followed by a group of highland bagpipers, the Boys and Girl's Club, the Carpinteria Senior Center, a bridal group on horseback, a gaggle of young skateboarders, and a group of dog owners with their pets advocating for a new dog park in town. Near the rear were the local Daughters of the American evolution club, a natural gas-powered sanitation truck, and a fire engine that occasionally blew its siren. In other words, it was a typical small-town parade. And smack in the middle, 21st in line, FOBB promoted the Beach Ambassadors and invited everyone down to the local nude beach at Bates.

This year we replaced some of the older signs and the new ones, especially the "Feel the Freedom" sign across the front grill, received much attention.

As our decorated truck passed the reviewing stand the two announcers, John Parmentari of KEY-TV and Dennis Mitchell of Carpinteria Valley Radio, read the paragraph (we submitted the text with our application) describing our mission. When Parmentari finished, both he and Mitchell ad-libbed additional sentences showing their support for our beach and commenting on our "Nudist and I Vote" pins. A super thank you to them both!

After the parade, FOBB treated the volunteers to dinner at Nutbelly's a local pizza/Italian cuisine restaurant on Linden Ave. As usual, the pizza, salads, and spaghetti all tasted delicious.

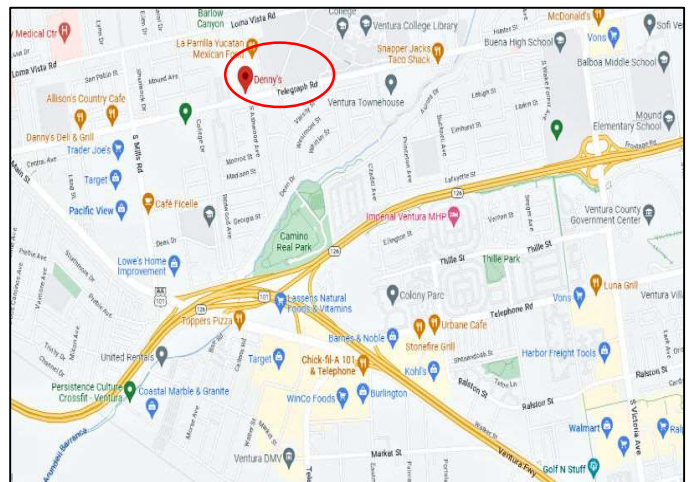

## FOBB Leaders Attend AZ Festival to Meet Other Beach Leaders

The Shangri-La Nudist Ranch was the site of this year's Western Festival, sponsored by The Naturist Society Foundation.

The 4-day festival attracted leaders from nudist beaches, hikers, and nudist clubs from all over the Western United States. They attended hourly workshops on interesting and fun topics such as the Future of Naturism, Places to Hike Nude, the latest in camping equipment, and How to Take Really Bad Naturist Photos. There was Chi Gung every morning and a drum circle at night.

The workshop that had the largest attendance was Government Affairs, hosted by FOBB's Gary Mussell and Cyndi Tendick, the current AANR-West President. The session reviewed several laws being proposed that could affect the nudist community, especially one in Arizona that would make it a felony to have children 15 and younger in the presence of naked people (outside the family). Nudists were organizing a letter-writing campaign urging the state's governor to veto the bill (she eventually did just that!)

The other most popular workshop was on "Women in Naturism" which was open to both women and men. There was a lively discussion about how women want to be treated at a beach or a club and how to make it more comfortable for new visitors at those locations.

Most of the workshops were held inside the air-conditioned clubhouse and library, which made it comfortable. The food at the restaurant was good and reasonably priced.

During lunch and dinner, participants informally shares their experiences and stories and gave advice.





## Many FOBB Members Attend the World Naked Bike Ride Through the Heart of Los Angeles

My experience with the WNBR-LA started in 2012. We were much smaller then and very much disorganized. I've been fortunate to participate in all the rides since then. I got so passionate about it that I have been volunteering to help for many years. This also put me in a unique situation, as I am an avid cyclist. This sets me up to be a ride monitor for every ride.

Ride monitors are an important part of our ride. We get to herd the riders and keep them moving and safe in traffic. Most importantly, the ride monitors are visual to LAPD that we have people making sure we follow the rules of the road and keep everyone in line with the laws. And we had some ride monitors who went above and beyond to keep everyone safe.

This year we eliminated our long ride, which was in the past, a 15-to-16-mile ride. It was too much for many people. Toward the end of the ride, we would be spread out over 2 miles. This year we created two rides, both about 7 miles long and different routes. I think the riders just enjoyed being able to ride clothes-free in downtown LA and they don't care where they ride. The routes we took passed some great landmarks, which made for great photo shoot stops. And we had some water stops along the way.

My job this year was to know where everyone was on our approved route, meaning the first rider to the last rider. So, I had to go to the front of the ride, then to the back of the ride, and determine if we needed to group up anywhere. I got to ride several extra miles.

On occasion, being up front, the view of the public is always priceless. They see a few nude riders go by and are in shock, then they see hundreds more riders and they are in awe. You could tell there was some jealousy that they were not on the ride. The support and enthusiasm from the public are probably 99.9 percent positive. Even the opposing traffic stops in the street to take pictures of us. No one honks or gets mad that we are blocking their way because they also want to see our ride.



In fact, at many traffic lights, the cars often refused to continue on their way at the green because they want to see more of us.

The supporting comments are priceless and encouraging. One comment that stuck with me was from two women who were standing at a crosswalk. As the first rider just passed them. one of the girls said, "We need to call the police!". The second girl said, "Girlfriend, the police are leading them!". I have seen men covering their wife's eyes with their hands while they watch us ride by. We have many people who happen to look out their apartment windows to shout positive words at us, and even flash us. People come out of the businesses just to watch us, and naturally take pictures. I can't imagine the stories they told later that day because it may have seemed unbelievable. As I mentioned, all this simply invigorated us as we rode by.

I must give thanks to our 60-plus volunteers for making this happen. We spent many months working on the details. And when we pull off a drama-free ride, it makes the hard work worthwhile.

And I must thank LAPD. Several weeks before the ride they said they would not show up unless we called them. Well, the Captain, and two of his officers, showed up early anyways just to check in with us. They said they would be leaving shortly, but they ended up staying around to watch us leave in mass on our first ride. They then hopped into an unmarked patrol car and followed us for at least half the ride. On the second ride, LAPD showed up again and did the same thing, watched us leave, and followed us. They always had the biggest smile on their faces! With all the drama that LAPD encounters every day, it must be refreshing to see nothing but happy riders and spectators.

Every year I always contact all the media and I get nothing from them, and the same for this ride. So, I contacted **HBO Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel** to come and film our ride. Their cameraman, Daniel, ended up rollerblading the entire second ride while carrying his camera! Since this was a public event, and it is HBO after all, no censorship was needed.

I also invited **Clothes Free International** to come out, and we were graced by Tim Chizmar doing a CFI TV segment on our ride. We got some high-power coverage. You will be able to see us shortly on their media channels. Our WNBR team will send out the notice on when the HBO and CFI footage airs.

So, my view from the front, middle, and back is made up of wonderful memories of people being able to be clothes-free in LA and I was honored we could help out to make it happen for our 16<sup>th</sup> ride.

## Dangerous Coastal Algae Near Bates Endangers Local Sea Lions

Several news media in Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties are warning beachgoers to stay at least fifty feet away from any sea animals, such as sea lions, they may encounter as many have become sick from harmful algae growing in the offshore seawater. This is due to domoic acid in the algae, a neurotoxin produced by phytoplankton. The toxin bioaccumulates in the fish that eat algae contaminated with this toxin and becomes more toxic as it moves up the food chain to larger animals such as sea lions and dolphins.

If you observe a live marine mammal (dolphins, seals, sea lions):

- **Do not touch:** Do not touch, feed, harass, cover, pour water on, coax/drag/push into the water or out of the surf zone, allow dogs near or take selfies with the animal. These are wild animals, and they may bite!
- **Observe animal:** Observe the animal from a minimum of 50 feet (length of a school bus). Keep people and pets away from the stranded animal. Note the animal's physical characteristics and condition.
- **Determine location:** Determine the exact location of the animal. Be as accurate as possible and note any landmarks so rescue teams can easily find the animal.
- **Call the marine mammal rescue hotline** at (805) 567-1505 or fill out an online rescue form [HERE](#). Provide your name, phone number, and specific information about the animal and its location
- **If you observe a dead marine mammal:** contact the Carpinteria public works department at (805) 755-4450 and leave a message with the location of the animal and the date and time you called.

If the animals have ingested less than a fatal dose, the toxins will take from 24-72 hours to clear their systems, and survivors will return to the ocean on their own.

## Have You Asked Your Friends to Sign Our On-Line Petition?



Our online petition drive to legalize the nude section of the beach passed 1653 signatures at the beginning of July. We plan another big push during the summer months to reach 2,500 signatures.

We ask all of our members (and their non-nudist friends) to add their names to the list.

You don't have to be a nudist to sign! We accept anyone who thinks we should be allowed our own safe space, no different than those who want a dog park or a tennis court.

Our Beach Ambassador Training Final Exam may now be taken via interactive PDF file online. Applicants no longer need to download and print a paper copy and mail it to us for grading.

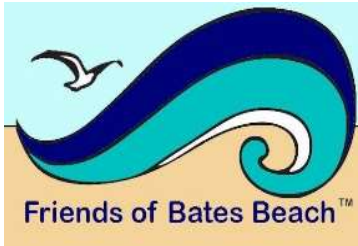


There are two parts to the quiz, one for textile beaches and one specifically for nude beaches.

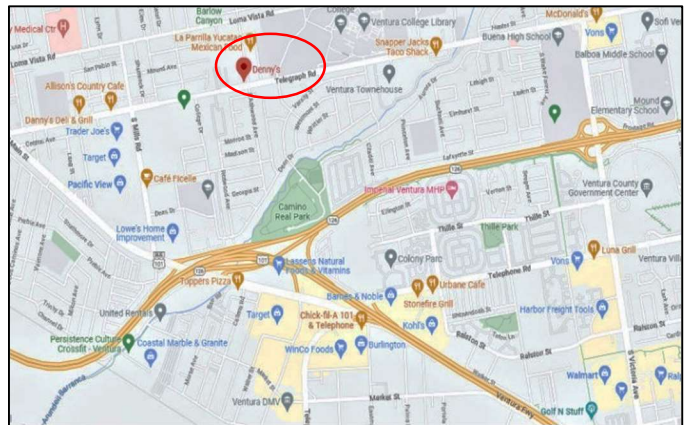
